How can you help at home?

Daily reading - Please encourage your children to read at home and note it down in their reading logs. They can read with an adult, brother or sister, friends, family or by themselves.

Time tables - The children have been focusing on rapid recall of their 2, 5 and 10 times tables. Year 3 - Autumn Term 2 2019 - What was it like to be a victorian child?

Key Focus

We will be refining our **Historical** skills this half term, by investigating the life of the Victorians. We will be **analysing** and **interpreting** information from different sources as well as deepening their **enquiry** skills. We will be looking at how different groups of people lived in the Victorian times compared to now.



Source analysis & interpretation

Curriculum Links

To deepen our understanding of the Victorians, we will be reading 'Fair's Fair' by Leon Garfield. This book is based on a homeless, orphaned, Victorian boy. In English lessons we will explore the experience of this particular child.

Throughout our theme lessons, we will go on to learn about Valentine Gray, the chimney sweep from the Isle of Wight whose untimely death helped lead to legislative change for the Victorians. We will then have the opportunity to consider the impact of homelessness today, how people may become homeless and what we can do to help.





Key Vocabulary

Please discuss these with your child at home.

Workhouse: a place where people received food and somewhere to live in return for work. Often orphaned children, the disabled and unmarried mothers had no choice but to go here!

The Industrial Revolution: the late 1700s to the early 1800s where manufacturing methods turned from people to machinery and the population grew rapidly.

Malnutrition: having so little food that your body is underfed so it cannot grow properly.

Poverty: being extremely poor. Many people lived in harsh conditions of poverty during the Victorian times.

Wealthy: being very rich.

Mining: the process of getting coal, or other materials from underground. The Victorians used to have young children working in the mines!

Child Labour: where children are forced to work in order to have enough to feed and home themselves.
