

Year 6 - Autumn Term 1 2022

Important facts to know by the end of this topic.


- ❑ There are two types of natural resources: renewable (can be used repeatedly) and non-renewable (once used cannot grow or return).
- ❑ Canada, Saudi Arabia, and China are the three countries with the greatest natural resources. China controls 90% of coal and rare-earth metals.
- ❑ More than 70 million people are displaced today. This is the highest number since WWII.
- ❑ Over two-thirds of the world's refugees come from five countries.
- ❑ There are almost 5,000,000 Syrian refugees risking their lives to escape a five year long civil war.
- ❑ Around half of the world's refugees are children; 111,000 of them had to flee their homes without their parents or families.
- ❑ Refugees are no different to us, they're simply unable to live in their homes over safety concerns.



Key Skills

Physical Geography - We will be looking at where in the world our natural resources (water, food,

energy and land) can be found. We look forward to the children debating which is the most important resource.



Human Geography - Developing our understanding of the effects war and conflict have on individuals leaving their homes. We will explore where refugees come from, where they seek safety and support and how this has changed the human geography of the Isle of Wight in comparison with Southampton and Portsmouth.




Locational Knowledge - Using maps and websites such as 'Datashine', we will explore trends of refugees and immigration to the UK considering the benefit this has to our country and island.



Our English this half term!

Our text driver this half term will be **Boy at the Back of the Class** by Onjali. Q. Rauf. It is a beautifully written novel which offers a child's perspective on the refugee crisis. A tale that highlights the power of supporting others in your community, we will be using the text to drive some powerful, emotive writing as we develop our writing stamina and sentence structures in line with Year 6 expectations.

The key skills we are looking at: Developing sentence structures and text coherence.



Key Vocabulary

Aerial photograph - Aerial photography is the taking of photographs of the ground from an elevated/direct-down position.

Displacement - the act of being moved

Immigrant - Someone who chooses to live in a country different to where they were born or the country of their nationality

Natural resources - naturally occurring substances or materials that are usually harvested by countries for trade and economic purposes.

Refugee - A refugee is a person that has been forced to leave their home country due to war, violence, conflict or persecution.

Our Mathematics this half term!

This half term we will be focusing on our knowledge of place value and the four operations of addition, subtraction, multiplication and division. Building on our existing understanding, we will learn how to handle numbers up to ten million, tackle multistep problems of addition and subtraction, master the skill of long division and understand the order of operations within calculations.

At home you could:

Download mental maths apps or games to support pace and efficiency in arithmetic. Also, even if your child had their times table badges, it is important encourage them to keep practising so they don't get rusty!
